- John the Baptist is a prophet who calls people back to God who asks them to say sorry. Baptism is a sign of forgiveness.
- Bad choices (sin) means that people turn away from God.
- Jesus forgives and saying sorry means that we can change and be better people.
- Jesus' miracles are signs He is the Messiah (promised one)
- Jesus' parables invite people to know more about God.
- Jesus brings healing in different ways.



- Water is a symbol of a new start in the Sacrament of Baptism.
- How Catholics say sorry in prayers (act of Sorrow/Our Father)



- The importance of saying sorry to God and others and in Acts of Penance.

Skills I need to use



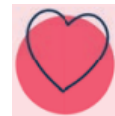
Retell the story of John the Baptist and the baptism of Jesus.

Recognise that Jesus uses parables to teach people about God..

Recognise that people are tempted to make bad choices (sin) but that God loves and forgives all people.

Recognise that miracles are signs that Jesus is the Son of God.

Use religious words to say how Catholics say sorry to God in prayer and why this is important.



Look at Jesus' baptism in art and talk about the images.

Make links with Isaiah and John the Baptist as prophets.

Talk about water as a symbol of a new start (reconciliation) and how this links to past learning (Noah/Baptism)



Reflect what it feels like to say sorry.

Talk about ways we can show we are sorry.

Consider what we can say sorry to God for and how praying can be a part of this.
